Barringer is probably the world expert on this group of artists who came together in 1848 to protest pollution caused by the industrial expansion and the lack of creative involvement with the ensuing mass production of household goods. Most museums have significantly increased their digital presence during the pandemic and are offering wonderful tours and events. Try the new app Bloomberg Connects from Bloomberg Philanthropies (available for free download from the Apple App Store) which is supporting the arts with new digital access to cultural institutions (so far in New York and London) like the Frick Museum, the New York Botanical Garden or London's Serpentine Galleries. — Shavaun Towers

Due to the ongoing constraints of the pandemic, the YUWO Lunch and Learn series will take place via Zoom this Fall.



On Tuesday, October 13, from 12:00 noon to 1:00 pm Marci Shore, Yale Associate Professor of History and incoming Director of Graduate Studies for the MA in European & Russian Studies, will present a talk on her research. Professor Shore specializes in European cultural, intellectual, and Jewish history, particularly Eastern Europe especially Russia, Poland, and Ukraine. She received her M.A. from the University of Toronto in 1996 and her PhD from Stanford University in 2001. Before joining Yale's history department, she was a postdoctoral fellow at Columbia University's Harriman Institute; an assistant professor of history and Jewish studies at Indiana University; and Jacob and Hilda Blaustein Visiting Assistant Professor of Judaic Studies at Yale. She is the author of *The Taste of Ashes: The Afterlife of Totalitarianism in Eastern Europe* (Crown, 2013), Caviar and Ashes: A Warsaw Generation's Life and Death in Marxism, 1918-1968 (Yale University Press, 2006) and the translator of Michal Glowinski's Holocaust memoir The Black Seasons (Northwestern University Press, 2005), as well as numerous scholarly articles and book reviews. Her newest book is titled The Ukrainian Night: An Intimate History of Revolution (Yale University Press); she is also at work on a longer book project titled

Everyone Has a Story! Learn to Write Yours, Two Pages at a Time

Beginning Thursday, September 17, YUWO member Margaret Flesher is offering a series of eight virtual Guided Autobiography sessions on Zoom. Along with creative activities, writing tips, and helpful prompts, each session introduces a major life theme for a story to write at home and share with the group in a safe, supportive setting. The weekly sessions run through November 5, from 10:00 a.m. to noon, and the cost for eight sessions is \$80. Group size is limited, to allow time for all to read their stories.

If you want to leave a legacy for your family, gain perspective on a life transition, start a memoir, or simply reflect on your life experience, the new YUWO Memoir Writers group will get you started on the right track. With its thematic approach, Guided Autobiography makes memoir writing accessible to everyone. You'll dig deep into your memories and write a two-page story each week.

The Guided Autobiography technique was developed by James Birren, a pioneer in gerontology research at the University of Southern California. Because it was developed in an academic setting, the method has been the subject of extensive testing and research that supports its benefits in fostering a sense of how one's life has mattered.

Margaret Flesher is a writer who helps individuals preserve memories and family history through writing their life stories. She is certified as a Guided Autobiography instructor by the Birren Center for Autobiographical Studies.
