President's Report for 2021-2022

In February 2022 I posed in a storefront in downtown Malaga, Spain. The scene is appropriate for a YUWO farewell photo. I spent my childhood in Springfield, Illinois. I left there for college and the East Coast. Springfield thrived in Lincoln's time and now as the capital. YUWO had an illustrious past before my time. Under new leadership YUWO will continue to grow. It is very difficult to sum up four busy, unusual years. 2018-2019 was a "normal year" with a September Welcome Reception at the Provost's House on Hillhouse Avenue and a May Annual Meeting and Scholarship Awards Lunch at the Lawn Club. Marta Moret, '84 MPH and President, Urban Policy Strategies, was able to stop by both events. In between our small interest groups thrived and our large lectures and Lunch and Learn talks were well attended. Then came 2019-2020. Up through December the YUWO routines continued, ending with the Holiday Party at the Q Club. In January 2020 Covid-19 appeared on the scene. We quarantined and cancelled. We used our phones and emails to communicate. Then we were introduced to Zoom by Dr. Meir Kryger, who gave our first Zoom talk. Some of us tried the free Zoom platform and then in June 2020 YUWO invested in a professional Zoom subscription. 2020-2021 was our Zoom year. The year began with a Zoom Welcome Reception. Henry (Sam) Chauncy spoke and showed slides from his book, *May Day at Yale 1970: Recollections*. We had 90 muted participants. We had learned to adapt. From our fall lecture series, "Year of the Woman," through our Lunch and Learn MacMillan Center speakers, large and small groups gathered on Zoom. By 2021-2022 we were vaccinated and began to meet bravely though often masked or outdoors. Our September Welcome Reception was held at the Graduate Club. Out of caution, the Board decided to postpone our large Holiday Party. Instead, most activity and interest groups gathered in person to celebrate the season and the New Year. Zoom continues to be our ally. YUWO speakers can enlighten us on a wide range of topics from A to Z, (Black Artists to Ukraine) from their homes in Old Lyme to their libraries in Vienna. I look forward to returning to YUWO in the fall of 2022 as a member and sometime advisor. I enjoyed the opportunity of guiding and working with you for four years. This has been a learning experience for me. Thank you to all the women who served on the Board as advisors and chairs. It takes a Village.

Lunch and Learn for 2021 ~ 2022

Due to the ongoing pandemic restrictions on the use of Yale buildings, the YUWO 2021-22 Lunch and Learn series took place via Zoom, from noon to 1:00pm. The procedure for joining was modified to include rsvp's and a waiting room, in order to increase security. Each of the speakers was very informative, energetic, and engaging.

On October 26, **Marijeta Bozovic**, Assistant Professor in Yale Slavic Languages and Literatures, spoke about “Imagining Russian Hackers: Myths of Men and Machines.” Professor Bozovic is affiliated with Film and Media Studies; Women’s, Gender, and Sexuality Studies; and the European Studies Council at Yale. She specializes in 20th and 21st-century Russian and East European literatures and cultures, with broad comparative interests in transnational cultures; avant-gardes, politics and poetics; translation and remediation; Danube River and Black Sea studies; digital humanities, new media, and cultural and political networks. She is Associate Editor of *ASAP/Journal*; co-editor of *Russian Literature*; co-curator of the Poetry after Language colloquy for Stanford University’s ARCADE digital salon; and a contemporary film and literature reviewer for *The Los Angeles Review of Books*.

On November 16, **Dudley Andrew**, Professor Emeritus of Yale Film Studies, gave a talk titled, “What Cinema Is.” Professor Andrew studied English and Philosophy, then learned filmmaking just as film studies was taking off in the United States. His dissertation on film theorist André Bazin has frequently taken him to France. He taught Comparative Literature and Cinema Studies at Iowa for years before coming to Yale in 2000. At Yale, he has worked with graduate students primarily on the French literary and philosophical milieu. He has taught undergraduate courses in World Cinema and in Adaptation, as well as seminars related to the work of Bazin, whose writings he continues to edit in English translation. He is a “commandeur de l’ordre des arts et des lettres,” a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and received the Lifetime Achievement award from the Society for Cinema and Media Studies.

On January 18, 2022, **Meg Oates**, an analyst at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) gave a talk titled, “Chasing Numbers Through the Sky.” Meg has 15 years’ experience in environmental policy. She works with NOAA’s marine aircraft operations, including the famous “Hurricane Hunters,” to incorporate changing needs and policy decisions into the President’s budget request to Congress. Meg’s work has spanned environmental issues including climate change and developing a new model to determine habitat restoration needs. These challenges require more and more specific data to help the nation better understand the impacts of climate change. NOAA’s aircraft are uniquely equipped to collect much of this data, and their operations are continually changing to meet the nation’s growing demands.

On February 15, 2022, **Julia Titus**, of the Yale Slavic Languages and Literatures Department, spoke about Dostoevsky as a translator of Balzac. Professor Titus has broad research interests including second language acquisition, heritage language teaching, bilingualism, translation studies, Russian literature and theater, and comparative literature, especially that of Russia and France. She has written extensively about the use of poetry, blogs, and online resources in language learning. Two of her books were nominated for the Best Contribution to Pedagogy award of the American Association of Teachers of Slavic and East European Languages (AATSEEL.)

On March 15, 2022, **Bradley Woodworth**, Coordinator of the Yale Baltic Studies Program, spoke about Music Associations and National Identity In Russia’s Baltic Provinces. He also commented on the notion of civil society in the lands of the Russian Empire and then the lack of one in the USSR and how this contributed to the situation in Russia and Ukraine today. He is also an Assistant Professor at the University of New Haven, and serves as Vice-President for Conferences for the Association for the Advancement of Baltic Studies (AABS.) His research interests include the modern history of the Baltic region, especially the lands that comprise the Republic of Estonia, and the history of the multiethnic Russian Empire in the tsarist period, including Finland.

On April 26, 2022, **Krystyna Illakowicz**, Senior Lecturer in the Yale Slavic Languages and Literatures Department at Yale, spoke on “Perceptions of American Women in Poland in the 1920s-1930.” She also teaches in the Yale Film and Media Studies Department, and has research interests in Polish language and culture in the global context, theatre and language acquisition, theatre, film, Polish and European modernity, Polish women and history. The subject of her talk is an ongoing project, based on articles from the popular press about the perceptions of the United States in Poland in the Interwar period (1918- 1939) during which time American women were presented as model representations of modernity that Poland wanted to emulate, although sometimes these images were really imaginary.

YUWO Scholarship Committee 2021 ~ 2022 Annual Report

Just one year ago, as YUWO members attended our Annual Meeting on Zoom, YUWO participated for the first time in the Great Give, an online giving program hosted by the Community Foundation for Greater New Haven. In just 36 hours, YUWO raised \$3,671 for the Scholarship Program, marking a strong beginning for our year of fundraising. This year, we awarded \$30,000 to four outstanding women who are listed below. We offer our sincere thanks to all those loyal donors who support our scholarships.

Our committee worked throughout the year with dedication and enthusiasm, balancing YUWO's traditions with the new realities of social media and the constraints of Covid-19. We worked to develop a clear, consistent message in our communications, updating our website and designing a new flyer to attract more applicants. We reached out to area college and university financial aid and admissions offices, Yale Affinity Groups and HR offices, local newspapers, libraries, and more. We were pleased to see 2021-22 Scholar Emily Roback featured in an article on the website of SCSU where she is completing her MBA.

In April, our committee met to review applications and determine awards. Reading the personal statements of applicants was inspiring as we learned how women have overcome obstacles, demonstrated resilience, and persevered to attain their personal and professional goals.

For the past two years, we were not able to celebrate our scholars in person because of the pandemic. Happily, at the 2022-23 Annual Meeting, we have the unique opportunity to celebrate not only this year's four scholars, but also those from 2020-21 and 2021-22. It truly is an honor to support these women!

YUWO leadership and membership's increased internet skills enabled YUWO to publicize information about the organization, its programs, and its members — all challenged by the pandemic but coordinating creatively.

President Mary-Jo Warren sent timely all membership email notices and reminders, coordinated and sent postal mailings especially to those unable to access the internet. Her personal membership in organizations such as the Yale Club of New Haven and Mory's gave us other connections for publicity.

Marty Sherman's expertise and assistance on many fronts was and is appreciated. Lecture Series 2021 ~ 2022

“People don’t care about what you know, unless they know that you care.” Teddy Roosevelt’s words are so applicable to YUWO’s membership and their continued support for the Lecture Series as we seek to fund scholarships for women in the Yale community. The Fall 2021 lectures, *YALE SUSTAINABILITY: A HOTBED OF HOPE*, gave us insight, new perspectives and great hope in successfully meeting the enormous challenges facing the world today in combating climate change. Our speakers offered their experience, expertise and enthusiasm in their presentations ranging from effective building planning and design (Ginger Chapman, Director of the Office of Sustainability at Yale); energy consumption (Julie Paquette, Director of Engineering and Energy Management at Yale); the development of the Living Village (Gregory Sterling, PhD (Dean, Yale Divinity School)); the multifaceted aspects of climate migration and its effects on public and mental health and climate change (Maya Prabhu, MD, LLB, Associate Professor of Psychiatry); the influence of land use management (Indy Burke, PhD, Dean of the Yale School of the Environment); the strengthening of global health systems (Ann Kurth, PhD, CNM, MPH, FAAN, Dean of the Yale School of Nursing); an inspiring understanding of the ideology of Ecology and Religion (Mary Evelyn Tucker, PhD, Senior Lecturer and Sr. Research Scholar at the Yale School of the Environment and Yale Divinity School); and finally to the research involving understanding public perceptions of and responses to environmental changes (Jennifer Marlon, PhD, Research Scientist and Lecturer at the Yale School of the Environment and the Yale Program on Climate Change Communications. We came away not only well informed, but committed to participation in the many efforts underway in our communities and our state.

**MINUTES of the Yale University Women's Organization Annual Meeting
on May 5, 2021
via Zoom**

Mary-Jo opened the business meeting at 12:32 PM via Zoom. Sixty-five members logged on with video and audio or both.

PRESIDENT'S WELCOME. Mary-Jo Warren: Due to the Covid crisis the Annual Meeting was held via Zoom. Mary-Jo welcomed everyone and thanked Elizabeth Parker for planning the program with Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro and Suzanne Spaulding, to follow the business meeting.

YUWO's Zoom account can now include up to 500 participants. Lecture programs for the next month will be offered to past members. Marty Sherman will include a new membership form with the invitation.

YUWO By-Laws require approval of the issues listed below. A quorum of 25 is necessary. Sixty-five YUWO members were present for the discussion and vote.

Minutes from the Annual Meeting held on May 28, 2020.

The minutes of the May 28, 2020 Annual Meeting held by proxy were emailed to all members for review prior to this meeting. Mary-Jo projected them on the screen as Susan Anderson read them to the members. An on-line poll was conducted. The minutes were unanimously approved by the membership

An online poll was conducted. The slate was unanimously approved by the membership.

Annual Report and Budget:

Nancy Rosenbaum presented the Annual Report approved by the board. Figures reflect a loss of income due to a decrease in membership and in-person gatherings due to Covid restrictions. Program expenses for excursions and large meetings were reduced. New expenses included additional printing and mailing and the Zoom contract necessary to substitute for in-person meetings. Dues will remain the same.

An online poll was conducted. The annual report and budget were unanimously approved by the membership.

By-Laws Review:

Carolyn Gould chaired the Committee reviewing the By-Laws, which is required every 5 years. She could not be present at this meeting, so Mary-Jo reported the recommendations from the Committee that have been approved by the board. The changes were circulated to the membership prior to the meeting. An on-line poll was conducted for each of changes proposed in the following areas: membership, elected, appointed and special officers, scholarship eligibility and changes necessary to comply with Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Program:

Elizabeth Parker introduced Rosa DeLauro, US House Representative from Connecticut's Third District and Chair of the House Appropriations Committee to discuss "Civics as a National Security Imperative." Representative DeLauro was interviewed by Suzanne Spaulding, of the Center for Strategic and International Studies. Discussion involved the need to improve the civics education in our country. Representative DeLauro is sponsoring a non-partisan bill to provide grants to states to improve the civics programs in their schools. She has long been a supporter of this but the events of January 6th have propelled the issue to the forefront and fostered non-partisan and bicameral support. Ms Spaulding is also working on civic education programs in schools and businesses through her work at CSIS.

Elizabeth thanked the speakers and proposed a return engagement to follow up on the progress of their endeavors.
